

Chapter VI

Full House to Empty Nest

March 20, 1954 – August 18, 1954

While all of the attention focused on Janet during the month of March, there was still plenty going on. On the third Saturday, Craig and Edith came up from Blacksburg and Roger Rowan brought Wade and Read to help Sheffield with the annual round up. Janet was still restricted to the house and was unable to help, but Takara took her place.

The round up went as usual, separating the new calves from their mothers and branding them, taking last years calves to market, picking out one for the freezer and one for the church auction, and replacing two older cows with heifers from last year. The first Cherry Blossom Festival was held in 1935 commemorating the gift of Japanese cherry trees from the mayor of Tokyo in March of 1912. The trees were donated in an effort to enhance the growing friendship between the United States and Japan. The festicval was suspended during World War II and resumed again in 1947.

On Tuesday they had just visited the Lincoln Memorial and strolled over to the Tidal Basin where the initial cherry trees were planted. A large number of people had gathered there, so they went closer to see what was going on. It just happened to be a ceremony in which the Japanese Ambassador, Sadao Iguchi, was making a presentation of a 300-year-old Japanese stone lantern to the City of Washington to commemorate the one hundredth anniversary of the first Treaty of Peace, Amity and Commerce between the United States and Japan signed by Commodore Mathew Perry at Yokohama on March 31, 1854. The eight foot lantern was made of granite and weighed approximately two tons. It was one of a pair of lanterns created in 1651, to mark the death of Tokugawa Iemitsu, the third shogun of the Tokugawa dynasty, and was formerly located at the Tōshō-gū temple, where its twin remains. After unveiling the lantern, the ambassador's daughter lit it as a symbol of peace.

After the ceremony, the Ambassador greeted those assembled and shook their hands. When he came to Takara, they carried on a conversation in Japanese in which she told him a little about herself and that she was in the United States as an exchange student and that she was going to attend college in the fall. Mr. Iguchi wished her well in her studies.

All day on Tuesday and Wednesday they toured the more important landmarks, particularly the halls of government.
